Solutions to the education problem

"There is a great opportunity to give leverage to a successful (education) programme locally, and help ensure motivated school leavers who are more employable and vibrant consumers." So says Guy Harris, the Southern Cape convenor for a Cape based NGO, Partnerships for Possibility for South Africa

According to Harris, one of the most significant issues facing the future is the issue of education. If the situation is not addressed urgently many more students, if they pass matric, will pass with a 30% education that will not help them in their post school life.

He says the powers that be need to ensure that schools get back to being at the centre of the community, as that is where maths, science, technology and innovation supported by effective literacy and numeracy skills can flourish and SA can regain its competitive-

"It is up to us to seize this opportunity. What really attracted me to this initiative, besides the education crisis, is how there can be co-learning for school principals and the business manager involved, and at the same time the business gets BBBEE SED points, a S18A tax deduction and claims back from the skills levy paid.

"One of the key economic strategies of George is to be a learning city, the 'Grahamstown' between Cape Town and Port Elizabeth. We have many excellent schools and many more which, with a bit of community support can reach similar standards of excellence. The positive way in which interactions with the education circuit locally have gone so far means we are well on our way to having an effective partnership. Business just needs to come on board."

During the past two years, PfP4SA has been working to strengthen the social fabric of society through building social cohesion, igniting citizen engagement, and empowering large scale social change, particularly in the field of education.

With a vision to build a 'country that works for all', PfP4SA for South Africa has committed itself to working alongside all stakeholders to provide 'quality education for all children in South Africa by 2022'

In 2010 it established a ground-breaking initiative called School @ the Centre of Community (S@CC), aimed at creating thriving schools at the centre of the communities they serve. The S@CC project facilitates partnerships between schools and businesses, resulting in positive impacts on those directly involved and the community at large.

Headed up by Dr. Louise van Rhyn, the programme incorporates a very simple idea of partnering business leaders with school principals.

By giving 10 days a year to a local school - less than a day a month - a business leader provides the principal with fresh leadership insights to transform a school, and hence an entire community. In return, the leader gets to hone his skills by getting hands-on leadership experience in a different environment from his normal day-to-day environment.

"We need to urgently get it up and running in the Southern Cape," says Harris
